NAZARETH HOUSE Johannesburg

Caring for Johannesburg's poor & suffering since 1894.

Nazareth House is owned and run by the Sisters of Nazareth, a Catholic religious order of nuns which was founded in England in 1857. They have in their employ a team of full-time managers to care for the medical, financial and technical well-being of the home. The Sisters and staff at Nazareth House care for 35 HIV+ orphans, 22 adult, terminally ill Aids patients, 135 frail aged and 10 mentally challenged women. Most of the residents of Nazareth House can no longer adequately care for themselves or be maintained by the community. They also run a clinic for over fifteen hundred patients from the local community.

Firlands Childrens' Home

The Salvation Army Firlands children's home is in Linden, a suburb in the north west of Johannesburg. The home caters for children of all ages and from all backgrounds. Most of the children have been placed in the home by the courts and social work departments. This is one of the three childrens homes run by the Salvation Army in Johannesburg and caters for approximately 70 children at a time. The home is run by Captain George Pavey and his wife with a staff of social workers and house parents
